

Medication for Addiction Treatment

Medication for Addiction Treatment (MAT) simply means using medication along with other support to help treat a person's substance use disorder.

Benefits of enrolling in a MAT program include:

- ◆ Reduced cravings
- ◆ Reduced illicit opioid use
- ◆ Reduced alcohol use
- ◆ Controlled withdrawal symptoms
- ◆ Reduced risk of overdose

Homer Medical Center offers the following FDA-approved medication options from providers trained in MAT:

Buprenorphine—also known as Suboxone (*prescribed as strips, pills, or monthly injection*)

Naltrexone—also known as Revia or Vivitrol (*prescribed as pills or monthly injection*)
